"A thrill of hope - a weary world rejoices and yonder breaks a new and glorious morn!"

Dear Friends,

It is no secret that I love music, but not many know just how much I love Christmas music. I never tire of the round-theclock Christmas music in the month of December. I get teary-eyed when I hear "I'll Be Home for Christmas", and my foot starts tapping when I hear "Rockin' Around the Christmas Tree." My favorite of all Christmas songs, though, is "O Holy Night." There is something extra-special about a song that marries thoughtful and thought-provoking lyrics with a soaring melody that makes your heart sing. Every line—from the thrill of hope for the weary soul to the promise of an end to oppression—feels weightier and more glorious with each new Christmas season.

The story of this beloved Christmas song begins in the small French town of Roquemaure, when a wine merchant, Placide Cappeau —a fellow known more for his poetry than his church-going—was asked by a parish priest to write a poem for Christmas mass. He turned to the gospel of Luke for inspiration, and then, "moved by his own work", he decided his words needed to be set to music, and he turned to Adophe Charles Adams, a popular Jewish composer.

"Cantique de Noel" debuted in 1847 at a midnight mass and became a favorite among French congregations, until it was banned by the church when Cappeau joined a socialist movement. Except that the French people loved it. And kept singing it. So much so that, a decade later, a reclusive American writer, John Sullivan Dwight —a Harvard Divinity grad who would have been a minister but for the debilitating panic attacks that kept him out of the pulpit—discovered the song and translated it for an American audience in 1855. He published the updated version in his magazine, "Dwight's Journal of Music," which propelled the song to popularity in the United States.

Only God could take these particular people—a poet who knew wine but not the true Vine, a composer who didn't call Jesus "Messiah," and a minister so crippled by anxiety that he could not go out in public—and use them to create such a powerful, enduring song. And only God can take us—with our doubts and our fears and our messy, upside-down lives—and call us Beloved.

Truly He taught us to love one another; His law is love and His gospel is peace. Chains shall He break for the slave is our brother And in His name all oppression shall cease. Sweet hymns of joy in grateful chorus raise we, Let all within us praise His holy name!

According to Nancy Boon, the first "Bazaar" was started to reduce the church's debt and continued through the years to help beautify the church. Some of the past financial donations were earmarked for pavement, windows, carpeting, and tables.

For sixty years volunteers gave of their time, talents and treasures to make the yearly event a success. The people in leadership positions have changed, but all were dedicated to make the Bazaar or Holiday Fair the best it could be!! They baked, created works of arts, knitted, quilted, made greeting cards, and recycled. An ongoing tradition was a delicious noon meal.

Prayer

Pastor Julie guided the committee with a prayer.

Minutes

Motion by Barb Petkovsek, seconded by Bonnie Weyer to approve the minutes of the September 19, 2024 meeting with the date correction of the Vacation Bible School (VBS). Voice vote taken with all "aye"; motion carried.

Financial Report

Motion by Stephanie Heck, seconded by Karlene Wallace to approve the financial report as presented by Bonnie Weyer reading Assistant Treasurer Don Quicker's written report. Voice vote taken with all "aye"; motion carried.

New Business

Review 2025 Committee Membership

Moderator Vine stated that there will be two (2) openings on the Investment Committee for this next term and asked if anyone had any information on the other committees.

Stephanie Heck stated that Lydia Schumacher has replaced Jenna Ziegler on the Christian Education Committee, and she will check with the other members to see if they will continue for another year and report back to Paul.

Congregational Meeting to Vote on Committees and 2025 Budget

The congregational meeting will be held on Sunday, December 8, 2024 right after the service.

Old Business

Review/Update Camp Scholarship Fundings and Guidelines

Moderator Vine shared the Ray Family Opportunity Fund Guidelines, application, and summary of camp scholarship funds provided since 2021.

Bonnie Weyer shared that the Ray Funds provided scholarships in 2024 for seven (7) UCC adults, six (6) non UCC adults, five (5) UCC children, and 13 non UCC children. The following is the breakdown per camp:

MORE \rightarrow

- Boyd Camp four (4) UCC adults and one (1) non UCC adult; three (3) UCC children, seven (7) non UCC children
- Mohr Camp five (5) non UCC adults and six (6) non UCC children
- Active Adult Camp two (2) UCC adults
- Youth Camp one (1) UCC adult and two (2) UCC children

Per the guidelines, there is a maximum of \$15,000 per year to be used for "positive impact upon the church and community, with strong application towards youth/adult religious education and enlistment and maintenance of congregational membership."

Bonnie Weyer suggested the following proposal:

- Take all applications, like in the past
- UCC adults and children receive 100% scholarship of the camp cost they are attending
- Non UCC adults receive 50% scholarship and non UCC children receive 75% scholarship for the camp cost they are attending, with the understanding that if the total cost of participants attending camp goes over the yearly budget of \$15,000, the non UCC applicants would be required to pay more of their camp cost

Since the Ray Funds are not only for church camps, but they could also be used for educational speakers, etc., Moderator Vine tabled this agenda item until next month with possible action at that time.
